Category	Comments from Stakeholders
Input on Engagements	Capacity development and local service delivery: <p>The World Bank should help local governments build capacity, so that they may prepare their own energy strategy, including how to measure their energy needs, how to recognize local potential, how to use existing energy infrastructure.</p> <p>The Special Allocation Funds (Dana Alokasi Khusus, DAK) are not designed to be managed by the provincial planning agency, which results in short-term planning by local politicians.</p>
	Regional development: <p>The World Bank should pay more attention to resource management, ensuring that natural resources and state assets will be used for the greater good.</p> <p>The World Bank should push for more infrastructure development outside Java. In some remote islands, one needs to walk days to get rice, cooking oil. Connectivity should improve between provinces, districts and cities.</p> <p>The World Bank should encourage each districts to have its own specialty products for production.</p> <p>What is the World Bank's involvement in advocating for industrial expansion, especially for districts or cities outside Java?</p>
	Human Development: <p>The World Bank needs to integrate gender, women and marginal community issues into the CPF at the inception.</p> <p>The CPF does not address the immediate needs of the education sector. If needed, the World Bank can partner with education institutions' instead of with government.</p>

	<p>Attention needs to be given to the disabled community, especially the hearing loss impaired community, which receives less attention and have less access to education, jobs, and basic services. Basic information is often not provided at airports, train stations, streets or other public facilities.</p>
	<p>Sustainable Energy for All:</p> <p>Energy efficiency programs often yield greater results with less cost, compared to building a hydro or geothermal project, especially when applied to small, micro businesses which comprise 60% of the GDP.</p> <p>How can the World Bank help Indonesia achieve the target of 23% sustainable energy into its framework? What is the strategy? It is very important to provide electricity in eastern Indonesia.</p>
	<p>Health-care and social protection:</p> <p>The World Bank can help communicate the government’s programs; many in rural areas do not know their basic rights. Many schools are not familiar with the newly issued education and health cards.</p>
	<p>Reducing inequality:</p> <p>The World Bank should pay more attention to micro businesses which comprise 98% of business entities in Indonesia.</p>
	<p>Corruption and Governance:</p> <p>How can the WBWorld Bank help ensure that more tax money collected and higher government spending will not suffer irregularities?</p>
	<p>Natural Resources:</p> <p>The World Bank needs to help maximize the forestry sector so it can provide more sustainable jobs.</p>
<p>Comments on approach and implementation</p>	<p>Is there a system established to replicate the World Bank’s projects so the government can copy its success to in other areas?</p> <p>How would can the WBWorld Bank balance industrial growth while at the same time protect the environment and avoid forest degradation?</p>

	<p>How will the World Bank promote better accountability by sub-national governments?</p> <p>Will the World Bank promote more community participation into its programs?</p>
	<p>The World Bank can act as a bridge between the government and the people, but sometimes the government does not provide policies that match needs.</p> <p>Many government policies are not not being properly monitored and controlled; results are far from the objectives, or worse, causing more problems to overcome.</p> <p>How to balance economic growth with community development? Better to alter the phrase of economic growth into “community growth” because with then the focus is on overall well-being.</p>
